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## 1. Introduction

This Privacy Notice explains how Berinsfield Health Centre uses your personal information, how we keep it safe, who we share it with, and your rights under data protection law. It supports safe, lawful, and transparent processing of your information and reflects the requirements of the UK GDPR and the Data Protection Act 2018.

You may also wish to read our short, easy-read summary (Privacy Poster) for a simple overview.

## 2. Why we keep information about you

Healthcare professionals are required by law to keep records about your health and any treatment or care you receive. These records help us give you the best possible care and protect your safety.

We collect information to:

- identify you and register you as a patient
- provide safe, effective healthcare
- contact you about appointments, results, and care
- manage our services and meet NHS requirements

If you do not provide the information needed for your care, we may be unable to provide services safely. Optional information (such as email or mobile number) may help us communicate efficiently but is not required.

## 3. What information we hold

We may hold the following types of information about you:

- Personal data (name, address, DOB, NHS number, contact details)
- Special category (health) data (conditions, consultations, referrals, results)
- Confidential patient information (information given in circumstances where a duty of confidentiality applies)
- Pseudonymised or anonymised data, where identity is removed for planning/audit/research purposes

## 4. Our lawful basis for using your information

We process personal and health information under the following lawful bases:

### For providing your NHS care

- Article 6(1)(e) – performance of a task in the public interest
- Article 9(2)(h) – provision of health or social care and treatment

These are the main bases for most of our day-to-day processing.

### Other lawful bases used in specific circumstances

For example:

- Legal obligation – Article 6(1)(c) (e.g., CQC inspections, DVLA notifications)
- Explicit consent – Article 6(1)(a) / 9(2)(a) (e.g., private insurance reports, some research uses)
- Public interest – Article 9(2)(j) (e.g., safeguarding, public health, research planning)

## 5. How we use your information

We use your information to:

- Provide direct care (appointments, medication, referrals, results, care coordination)
- Work with other NHS providers to ensure safe and effective treatment
- Undertake safeguarding of children or vulnerable adults where required by law
- Improve services, run audits, and monitor quality and safety
- Carry out statutory NHS reporting and planning
- Support approved research, using anonymised data wherever possible

We do not use automated decision-making that produces legal or significant effects without human involvement.

## 6. Who we share your information with

We only share information when necessary, using the minimum needed, and only where there is a lawful basis or you have given consent.

Examples of organisations we may share with:

- NHS hospitals and community services
- Pharmacies
- Out-of-hours and urgent care services
- Local and national NHS bodies
- Safeguarding teams
- Mental health teams
- Research organisations (where permitted by law and/or consent)
- Public Health authorities

- Care Quality Commission
- Police or coroner (where legally required)

Full details of all categories, purposes, lawful bases, and processors can be found in Appendix A.

## **7. Uses beyond direct care: planning & research**

Health information is sometimes used to:

- plan and improve NHS services
- monitor safety and quality
- support approved research
- understand local health needs

Where possible, these uses are carried out using anonymised or de-identified information.

If identifiable information is needed, this will only happen when the law allows it, or you have provided explicit consent.

## **8. Your choices – opting out**

You can choose to limit the use of your information for planning/research:

### **Type 1 Opt-Out**

Stops your GP record being shared outside the practice for planning/research (unless required by law or for your care).

### **National Data Opt-Out (NDOO)**

Stops NHS England and other NHS organisations from using your confidential information for planning/research.

## **9. Children and Young People**

We take additional care when processing children's data. Children have the same rights as adults under UK GDPR.

Young people aged 16–17 can usually make their own decisions about how their information is used. Younger children may be able to do so if they are Gillick competent.

Proxy access for parents/guardians is only granted when appropriate checks are completed.

## **10. How long we keep your information**

We follow the NHS Records Management Code of Practice for all retention periods. Records are securely destroyed when no longer needed.

## 11. Your rights under data protection law

You have the right to:

- be informed about how your data is used
- access your record (Subject Access Request)
- request corrections
- request restriction of processing
- object to certain uses
- data portability (where applicable)
- rights relating to automated decision-making

SARs can be made verbally or in writing. We may need to verify your identity to protect confidentiality.

## 12. Data security & personal data breaches

A personal data breach is an incident where personal data is lost, altered, accessed or shared without authorisation.

If a breach occurs, we will:

- contain and investigate it
- assess risks
- notify affected individuals if there is high risk
- report to the ICO within 72 hours where required

## 13. Communication Preferences

If you give us your:

- **mobile number**, we may text you appointment reminders or important messages
- **email address**, we may send information about your care unless you opt out

Our website may use cookies to support functionality.

## 14. International transfers

We do not routinely transfer personal data outside the UK. If this changes, we will ensure appropriate safeguards and update this notice.

## 15. Freedom of Information (FOI)

FOI applies to organisational (non-personal) information only. To request your own records, you must submit a Subject Access Request instead.

Risk stratification tools used in the NHS help determine a person’s risk of suffering a particular condition and enable us to focus on preventing ill health before it develops.</p> <p>Information about you is collected from a number of sources including NHS Trusts, GP Federations and your GP Practice. A risk score is then arrived at through an analysis of your de-identified information. This can help us identify and offer you additional services to improve your health.</p> <p>If you do not wish information about you to be included in any risk stratification programmes, please let us know. We can add a code to your records that will stop your information from being used for this purpose. Practices can also receive payments for certain national initiatives such as immunisation programs and practices may also receive incomes relating to a variety of non-patient related elements such as premises.</p> <p>Finally there are short term initiatives and projects that practices can take part in. Practices or GPs may also receive income for participating in the education of medical students, junior doctors and GPs themselves as well as research. In order to make patient based payments basic and relevant necessary data about you needs to be sent to the various payment services.
